THE NEW CITIZENS OF THE WORLD

With the decline in global fertility rates exceeding all expectations, world population growth is expected to come to a halt well before the end of this century. In advanced economies depopulation is already underway, a trend made all the more difficult to slow down or reverse because fertility rates decline together with the number of women of childbearing age. As fewer people enter the labour market, economic growth and innovation rates are hindered as well. We come from a world without enough jobs, we are now in a world without enough workers. OECD countries today suffer from labour shortages at all levels. This is made all the more true because people in advanced economies have career aspirations that don't match with the gaps in the labour market. Today, the most required occupations include domestic care, cleaners, waiters, bartenders: jobs that offer low wages, long hours, poor career prospects and which in a large percentage of cases do not allow workers to make ends meet. Because the objective characteristics of these jobs are hard to change, even higher salaries struggle to attract those who stay out of the labour market. The demand of households and businesses is also very sensitive to changes in labour costs: the risk is that higher wages would lead it to drop vertically, thus reducing care and other services offered to the community.

Many young people do not work and are not part of the education system. The NEET phenomenon, which describes those Not in Employment, Education and Training, is the other side of the coin of an increasingly widespread youth malaise. "I was twenty. I won't let anyone say those are the best years of your life." The opening line of Paul Nizan's *Aden Arabia* could not be more timely. In the last 15 years, statistics tied to stress and depression have shown profound changes with regards to age. Until 2010, more than 600 sample surveys conducted in almost 150 countries around the world consistently described a bell-shaped pattern of unease by age: the reported degree of dissatisfaction with one's life increased with age and culminated around the age of 50, in the so-called mid-life crisis, and then declined in old age. Since then, much has changed: dissatisfaction now peaks in adolescents and then gradually decreases with age. The increase in distress among adolescents is confirmed by the data on diagnoses of depressive states among college students in the United States and other countries. This malaise manifests itself in multiple forms: anorexia, bulimia, addictions, self-harm, violence, suicide, school drop-outs and social withdrawal. And it involves many: according to Unicef, approximately 11 million children and adolescents in the European Union suffer some form of psychological distress.

Many explanations have been offered for this phenomenon, though, as always, it likely stems from a combination of factors rather than a single reason. The pandemic has left behind a trail of distress, having deprived adolescents for a long time of fundamental social interactions in that delicate developmental phase permeable to environmental conditions. However, the cause most frequently cited is linked to early access to social media and the restrictions imposed by parents on real-life interactions out of a form of overprotection of their children. Possible remedies to this state of affairs should be sought in offering alternatives to the obsessive use of smartphones, rather than prohibiting their use. Instead of using NRRP funds to distribute electronic devices to primary school students, it would be better to allocate those resources to building football pitches, basketball gyms and swimming pools, encouraging sports and social life. Music can also be a powerful antidote against depressive states and marginalisation.

After adolescence, the most powerful tool against youth distress is the fulfilment of one's professional aspirations. And yet, the transition from school to work is often so difficult that, in a country like Italy, half a million often highly educated young people

have moved abroad in the last 10 years in search of employment. Instead of questioning the reasons for this exodus, the general focus is on immigration. For reasons that are often not strictly economic, people fear the arrival of immigrants and support parties and political leaders who place the closure of borders and the mass deportation of those illegally present in the country at the centre of their communication strategies. Such proposals, though nominally put in place to contain migratory flows, generally tend to make integration harder, transforming immigration into a continuous emergency. Yet never before have the richest countries in the world so desperately needed migrant labour. In the short term, it is often the only resource they can draw on to meet the demands of families in need of domestic care and businesses desperate for workers in a wide range of jobs. Immigration also serves to improve public accounts, making pension systems more sustainable: because immigrants are younger than the native population, there is a significant increase in the number of those who pay social security contributions compared to those who receive these payments in the form of pensions. Second and third-generation immigrants in particular, if encouraged by favourable citizenship laws and investments in education, can make an important contribution to economic growth. On the other hand, there are those who believe that, to counter demographic decline, borders should be closed and women should be encouraged to have more children. But how should families be supported? And why should immigration and increasing fertility rates be opposing goals? Well-managed immigration reduces the cost of having children and frees up time for women in particular to devote to their professional development, also strengthening their contractual position in the family. In Turin, from May 30th to June 2nd, we will be addressing these issues with the contribution not only of economists, sociologists and psychologists, but also with first-hand accounts of those with expertise in immigration, the changes taking place in the organisation of family life, the evolution of the labour market and youth distress.

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Future Economy - the International Festival of Economics for the youth

One of the aims of the International Festival of Economics is to actively involve young people in order to promote a greater awareness of the socio-economic issues that are crucial for their future and their everyday choices.

Within the program, numerous scheduled events deal with topics of interest to the new generations with a special focus on the themes of technological change and its impacts, as well as knowledge development.

In particular, the **Future Economy** format includes awards for the winners of the **EconoMia** and **EcoQuiz** competitions, which involve first and second-grade schools from all over Italy, and **workshops** in which participants will actively practice defending themselves against fake news, explore the workings of electoral systems and take part in **family-oriented workshop** activities organised by the **Savings Museum**.

The commitment to promoting in-depth economic and financial education was also articulated in the months leading up to the festival. From March to May 2025, two different pathways to the International Economics Festival involved students from high schools in Turin and Piedmont.

The first, organised by the Education Area of the **Unione Industriali Torino** and the **Collegio Carlo Alberto**, connected the experience of academic teachers to twelve high schools. Through workshops and lectures, the teachers provided innovative keys to understanding the various fields of application of economic theories.

The second, organised by **Legacoop Piemonte** and the **Collegio Carlo Alberto**, proposed peer-to-peer education experiences in collaboration with the Associazione Allievi del Collegio Carlo Alberto and Youtrend, ranging from topics regarding financial education to the problematisation of the use of content on social media and the role of youth participation in elections.

The International Festival of Economics finds a frame of reference in Torino Futura, an initiative of the City of Turin that was born to offer a cultural project for young people and schools of all levels. The project, coordinated by the Cultural Policies and Educational and Youth Policies Departments, is based on four major cultural festivals that have centred their activities on the development of critical thinking: Biennale Democrazia, Biennale Tecnologia, Festival Internazionale dell'Economia e Salone del Libro. Through these events, Torino Futura intends to permeate all of the city's major cultural events with specific actions and activities aimed at young and very young people, multiplying occasions for reflection, dialogue and civic protagonism throughout the course of the year. It is in fact of paramount importance to offer young people opportunities for education and real civic engagement that stimulate a sense of community and active citizenship.

In order to try to answer this question, instead of starting with an analysis of the changes in a geopolitical, social, climatic and productive economic structure that no longer exists, instead of trying to patch up the pieces of a shattered globalisation, let us start with an analysis, albeit a cursory one, of the new features that are confusedly glimpsed and that could lead to a different structure from the one we know. Therefore, this is not a discussion on what to expect in the future, but rather the presentation of a tool - a pair of glasses - to help us see a little better and frame a different future.

This generation is distinguished by specific social attitudes and behaviors, reasserting its visibility in the public sphere. Yet despite its potential, it often remains invisible to current politics and policies. The discussion with representatives of different youth groups allows us to question this contradiction and possible responses to enhance the role of this new generation in the revitalization of the country.

He has been Senior Economist at the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD), a consultant to the International Monetary Fund, the World Bank, the European Commission, the International Labor Office as well as the Italian government. From March 2015 to February 2019, he served as President of the National Social Security Institute (INPS). He is Scientific Advisor of the Rodolfo Debenedetti Foundation (www.frdb.org), of which he has been Director since its establishment in 1998. He is a Fellow of the European Economic Association and the European Association of Labor Economists. He is also a Research Fellow of the Innocenzo Gasparini Institute for Economic Research (IGIER Bocconi), CEPR (Centre for Economic Policy Research), Centre for Economic Performance in London, and IZA (Institut zur Zukunft der Arbeit) in Bonn. He is a member of the Editorial Board of Covid Economics. He has been a columnist for "Il Sole 24 Ore," "La Stampa" and "la Repubblica," and has contributed to foreign newspapers such as the "Financial Times" and "Le Monde." He is among the founders of the economic information website www.lavoce.info and the federated English-language website www.voxeu.org. He is Scientific Director of the Turin International Economics Festival and Editor of "Eco," a new monthly economics magazine in Italian and English.
